

Event Synopsis



This month we had a great weather day for Autox #3, with a full roster of 142 hopeful drivers in attendance. The course flowed nicely with only a few DNFs and cone collisions. There were a few spins in the early runs on cold tires, yet overall, a smooth flow of cars on course allowed for four runs per group. Times in the 40 second range were typical and a very close battle for TTD ensued among cars with doors. Just as we thought a car had laid down a TTD lap, a competitor would best it!

We have some really good drivers in our regional group; if you look at the real time results on the club website you will note many of our top drivers' times are very close throughout the day, usually improving slightly with each pass. Consistency in improving run times, with only an occasional cone hit, is a sign of strong 10/10 focused driving.

The contest for top time of the day for production cars was super close. **Chis Mayfield**, in his nifty Lotus Evora, had the honors with a 36.936 second run. Drivers with times within less than a second of Mayfield's time are as follows: **Jason Bucki** (best pax index), **Doug Rowse**, **Nick Sloan**, and **Bruce Hanson**. TTD for non –street cars went to **Chuck Voboril** with a fast time of 35.250 in his D MOD open wheeled sled.

It was a fun day with a hot dog lunch, sunny skies, and great all-day fellowship. Be thankful and don't forget to show your appreciation to those who are on site before 6 AM setting up the course, doing safety inspections, and prepping the registration area, etc. All this great efficiency is an orchestrated effort. Your fellow racers, Crew Chiefs and Steering Committee members are all working behind the scenes to make your event a seamless and enjoyable experience. It's up to all 251 members of PASR to pitch in and make a contribution. It begs the question, what have you done for your club lately?

Andy confessed he "likes to go fast" and has done so a drag racer for the past 25 years. He is fairly new to the autocross game and seeks to perhaps win a class trophy one day in the future. The development of his driving skills may be due to his early experience in BMX racing and lots of drag racing over the years. Andy and girlfriend Leeann, a Porsche Boxer PASR autocross gal, are residents of Peoria where they live with their two pups Sammy and Spike. Keep an eye on this fellow -- it's very likely he will just get better and better with experience as an autocross enthusiast.



Brad Ryan, nicknamed "Spinner", is the third owner of his very cool, authentic 1967 Corvette big block coupe. Back in the day Corvette big blocks ruled the drag strips and road course events put on by SCCA and hot rod associations. They were, as it was said then, "The Big Dogs" going head-to-head with Fords Cobras and other 70's muscle cars.

Brad's Silver '67 survivor was ordered new with all the available options, except the J-56 brakes. The L36 big block feeds a four-speed close ratio tranny which vents through side exhausts. Additional features on the classic Vette includes a posi rear member, air conditioning, leather seats, rally wheels, close ratio steering, electric radiator fans and many more performance equipment features. The '67 survivor adds both class and historical value to our local events; its appearance and ground shaking exhaust sound takes us back in time to the origins of autocross.

Way cool ride Brad! Welcome back to the Autox game after a twenty-five-year layoff from your Autox days of old with the Chicago Corvette Club. Please return soon as your car is a pleasure to watch on the course under power.


Tech Tip of the Month



To wrap up the Tom Brady series of Performance Tips we visit his chapter on pre-performance attitude, brain fitness and plasticity. It's a lot to summarize, so for a full review of this material you can go to his web site http://tb12brainhq.com.

Some of main points include:

- Brady defines success of the mind as "knowing that you did your best to become the best you are capable of becoming." To me, he is saying we humans have the potential for constant improvement.
- Don't focus on the negative. We gain nothing by being angry or negative. Here's where positive affirmations, visualization of success and calming thoughts come into play before it's game time on the skid pad.
- 3. Seek wisdom by knowing the difference between those things you can and can't change. (Where have we heard that before?)
- Seek the mental preparation "Zone." If you are too calm, fire up a bit. If you are too excited to focus, do some calming things before you perform. Find your mental Zone.
- 5. Stay mentally pliable. Be open to new ideas, input and information!


How can **you** help make each PASR event a success?
